40 - DAY LENTEN SEASON Our Time for Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving

A TIME OF REPENTANCE

"Between Ash Wednesday and Easter, many Christians observe a 40-day period known as Lent. . . . Lent is meant as a time of repentance. "Scholars believe Maundy Thursday was the day when Jesus celebrated His final Passover with His disciples. Jesus led His disciples in the first act of Lent of humility, love, and service. Jesus then commanded His disciples to go and serve likewise." "Both Protestants and Catholics participate in forms of fasting and praying [and almsgiving] during the 40-day period of Lent to honor and remember the suffering of Jesus in the weeks before His death and resurrection" (crosswalk.com).

HOLY WEEK

Holy Week is March 24-30, 2024, a string of eight days that allow us an opportunity to reflect upon the shift in humanity Jesus' sacrifice on the cross launched. It starts with Palm Sunday when Jesus enters the city of Jerusalem. The week leads us through the Last Supper, His crucifixion, and ends on Easter Sunday with His resurrection. COLORECTAL CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

Preventable, Treatable, & Beatable



National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month is an annual dedication to raise awareness about colorectal cancer, emphasizing its prevention, early detection, and treatment options. It's a time to highlight the significance of regular screenings, celebrate survivors, remember those we've lost, and rally for continued research and education.

Anyone can get colorectal cancer. It's most common among African Americans and people over age 50. According to WebMD, the lifetime chance of developing colorectal cancer (CRC) is 1 in 22 for men and 1 in 24 for women. In 2023, approximately 153,020 individuals were projected to be diagnosed with CRC and 52,550 to die from the disease, including 19,550 cases and 3750 deaths in individuals younger than 50 years (PubMed). More than one half of all cases and deaths are attributable to modifiable risk factors, such as smoking, an unhealthful diet, high alcohol consumption, physical inactivity, and excess body weight (Wiley's.onlinelibrary).

Ways to Reduce Your Risk



Quit smoking.

And/ or quit using other forms of tobacco, including chew.



Exercise regularly.

Physical activity can reduce your risk of colorectal cancer by as much as 50 percent.



Eat well and keep a healthy weight.

Discuss a diet and exercise plan that works for you with your provider.



Limit alcohol consumption.

Drink more water. Water has no calories; so, it can also help with managing body weight and reducing calorie intake.



Get screened.

Screenings help find problems early on when they may be easier to treat.

WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH Facts About Women's History Month

Women's History Month can trace its roots back to 1857. During this time, women from various New York City factories protested poor working conditions.

The first Women's Day celebration in the United States was in 1909. However, the catalyst for Women's History Month began as a local weeklong celebration in Santa Rosa, California. In 1978, the Education Task Force of the Sonoma County Commission on the Status of Women planned a celebration that corresponded with International Women's Day, and the movement took off across the country.

Women's groups and historians lobbied for national recognition in 1980. In February of that year, President Jimmy Carter issued the first Presidential Proclamation declaring the week of March 8 as National Women's History Week.

Congress designated the entire month of March as Women's History Month in 1987.

Dr. Gerda Lerner, who was a key figure in the fight for this national observance, said, "Women's history is women's right."

WOMEN MATHEMATICIANS Human "Computers" at NASA







As America stood on the brink of a Second World War, the push for aeronautical advancement grew ever greater, spurring an insatiable demand for mathematicians. Women were the solution. Ushered into the Langley Memorial Aeronautical Laboratory in 1935 to shoulder the burden of number crunching, they acted as human computers, freeing the engineers of hand calculations in the decades before the digital age.

Sharp and successful, the female population at Langley skyrocketed. Dorothy Vaughan, Katherine Johnson, and Mary Jackson were among the trailblazers at NASA. Called the West Computers, after the area to which they were relegated, they helped blaze a trail for mathematicians and engineers of all races and genders to follow.
